

Why is design for dementia an issue in hospital settings?

Hong Kong Population : age ≥85



Prevalence and projection



70 years old or above Community-dwelling Dementia prevalence:

<u>9%</u>

Demands on healthcare system



Almost half of adults occupying hospital beds are age ≥ 65



53% accident and emergency admission



30-40% older adults were cognitively impaired



68% of all unplanned readmissions

The Problems

Too noisy

Are disorienting

Do not provide familiar activities

Make people feel imprisoned

Not designed to prevent falls

Not taking account of the special needs

The special challenges


The most distressed people

The most disabling environments





Physical environment



Design to compensate rather than relying the person to make adjustment

A therapeutic setting

Reduce behavioral and affective symptoms

Less dependence in conducting activities of daily living

Working to become Dementia Friendly

What should be considered?

Elder-friendly design features

Suitable and safe floor and wall finishes

Clear visual keys for safe way-finding and elderly accessible toilet facilities

Enhancing mobility and access,


Well placed seating, and handrails,

Appropriate illumination and acoustic enhancement,

Flooring: non-glare finish, no patterns or contrasts within main floor



Consistent floor colour





Colour: avoid soft pastels, skirting contrast, warm(yellow, red, orange)





Colour and Contrast: key to vision



Signs: disorientation & bewilderment experience

Door bell



Signs: consistent, height, pictorial representation, matte surface









Orientation: Large clocks, calendars; picture






Orientation: Way finding



Furniture and passive alarm



Clear, unimpeded pathways



Washroom/Shower room




Day room: balance use of space

Social gathering/activities space




General accessibility hand railings, sitting spaces










Nurses station





Lighting: require 30% more light. ranges from 20 to 600 lux

Less noise: less use of TV, acoustic panel




Noise
